I am writing on behalf of the Criminal Law and Individual Rights Section of the District of Columbia Bar¹ in support of the funding application submitted by the D.C. Prisoners' Legal Services Project, Inc.

The Criminal law and Individual Rights Section of the District of Columbia Bar is generally composed of local criminal justice and civil rights practitioners, legal educations and other bar members with extensive experiences working with incarcertaed D.C. Code offenders. Prisoners with AIDS and HIV infection often receive discriminatory treatment in the correctional system. They are stigmatized, lack access to adequate medical care, subjected to breaches in confidentiality, have a poor understanding of their legal rights, and receive very little, if any, reliable educational information.

Currently there are no legal services providers engaged in a systematic effort to provide legal support services for this under-served population. The proposal submitted by the D.C. Prisoners' Legal Services Project, Inc. represents a realistic effort to fill this void. The Criminal Law and Individual Rights
